9.1 Welcome and Opening Remarks by the Chairperson

At the outset, Prof. Ranjan Bose, Director, IIITD and Chairperson, IQAC, welcomed all the members to the 9th meeting of the IQAC, participating in person or online. Thereafter, Dr. Sriram K, Coordinator/Director, IQAC, welcomed the members of the IQAC and proceeded to present the agenda items

9.2 Confirmation of Minutes of the 8th Meeting of the IQAC

The minutes of the 8th IQAC meeting held on May 16th, 2025, were circulated among the members. As no comments were received, the minutes were confirmed as circulated.

9.3 Action Taken Report

The Action Taken Report (ATR) on decisions from the 8th meeting was reviewed by the members. The committee noted the actions taken and expressed satisfaction with the progress.

9.4 Items for Information

The Director, IQAC, shared updates on recent significant developments at the Institute. The committee acknowledged and noted this update. No further discussion was raised on these items.

9.5 Items for Discussion and Consideration

9.5.1 Review of actions taken on the Ethical Use of Artificial Intelligence tools in Academics (as discussed in the 8th IQAC meeting):

The Committee noted Dr. Praveen Priyadarshi's presentation based on a student survey on the use of AI tools, which showed that students widely use AI for learning and assessments, see it as partly replacing classroom learning, and have concerns about incorrect results, over-dependence, and unclear rules on ethical use.

The Committee also noted challenges in ensuring learning outcomes and fair assessment in an AI-enabled setting, and discussed the need for clear institute-level guidelines, better assessment design, early communication to students, and the fact that currently there is no comprehensive AI policy, except for a self-declaration requirement in student theses.

9.5.2 Deliberation on further strategies to promote the ethical and responsible use of AI in teaching and learning:

After due deliberation, the committee recommended the following:

1. To organize an institute-level workshop on AI in academics, with participation from faculty members and external experts.
2. To use inputs from student and faculty surveys, along with expert discussions, for the drafting of AI-related academic guidelines and take it up to the upcoming Senate meeting for the consideration.

The Committee further advised that, as an interim measure, the course instructors should clearly specify AI usage norms for their courses at the beginning of the semester.
